## SUMMER 2019 IS HERE ... GET EXCITED!

Each summer campers come to Laurelwood to connect with friends (both old and new), gain new experiences and build lasting memories. Laurelwood is more than just 140 acres of land. Laurelwood is about the connections that the campers and staff create, it is about the moments that we want to last forever and it is about creating opportunities for campers grow. One of the ways we do this is by continuing to provide campers with new programming. This year we are thrilled to bring two new programs to Laurelwood: **Woodworking and Robotics**.



In our newly renovated woodworking building, campers will learn to use basic hand tools and power tools in a safe and supervised setting, while creatively building objects from wood that can be brought home or be used to leave their legacy at camp. Some example projects are: Birdhouses, pencil cases, and benches. We are excited to welcome Max Holland, from England, to lead the campers in this area. Max comes with a vast amount of experience and is excited to be part of the Laurelwood family.

Robotics at camp will take place in the **Katz' Digital Media Center**, newly renovated in 2018. Through the leadership of Sevde Nur, campers will use Vex Robotics to allow campers to create and program robots with a variety of objectives. Campers will have the opportunity to design, build and code robots. We can't wait to see the campers' creations in action this summer.

Throughout the year, camp has made some significant facilities updates to continue to beautify camp. A favorite place on main campus is the fire pit outside of Canteen. Thanks to Dylan Cancelliere, updates have been made to the fire pit seating. Dylan is a local Eagle Scout and for his project he built permanent seating around the Canteen firepit that will be

enjoyed by all of our campers this summer. Additionally, the inside of the Canteen was remodeled to include new tables, chairs and a beautiful new floor.

Main campus will also feature a new hangout spot this summer, **Hammock Village** which will house a "village" of hammocks for our campers to hang out at. This will be a great spot to read a book, chat with friends, or just rest!

The shower house on Girls' Campus has also received a facelift which features several really important updates and improvements. First, we have added a closet that will house all the campers' shower needs (shampoo, soap, shower-caddy, etc.) which will make it easier for our campers & staff during shower hour while keeping our bunks and fronts steps less cluttered. We also have installed brand new flooring in the shower house.

The mess hall kitchen has been updated as well, with a new walk-in refrigerator and freezer, a new oven, and several other appliances. Along with our new Executive Chef, Abraham, these updates will continue to improve our food quality and make sure that our campers, staff and guests get delicious and nutritious meals.

Lastly, the Chuppah (covered basketball court and indoor stage) roof, which was 40 years old and had several leaks, has been replaced this year. Thanks to Steven Pite and his family, the Chuppah will continue to provide countless memories, be it during Shabbat, talent shows, basketball games, dances, and other important special event, all under a leak-free roof.



As we look beyond 2019, we are excited that improvements and updates in both programming and facilities areas will continue to make camp an exciting place for campers to spend their summers.

It has been almost a decade now that Laurelwood has taken part in a North America camp staff fellowship program known as Cornerstone. Sponsored by the Foundation of Jewish Camp (FJC), the Cornerstone Fellowship offers returning staff a way to; connect with others (from more than 60 Jewish Camps) who are passionate about Jewish camp, develop skills to make a positive, innovative impact on our community, exchange ideas, attend workshops, trainings and immersive experiences while creating programs and activities for campers at their respective camps. Over the last 16 years, 3,600+ fellows have participated in this transformative leadership experience.

Our Cornerstone Fellows attended a 5-day seminar of leadership and Jewish Content learning, in collaboration with participants from 62 other Jewish camps from around North America. At the seminar, 400 staff members from Jewish camps across North America came together for workshops, song sessions, and campfires, learning from seasoned camp staff and from each other. Cornerstone Fellows share "magic" and ideas among their camps, creating a new type of camp community. Through their learning and collaboration they have created a variety of projects to implement and supervise at camp this summer.

**NEW THIS SUMMER:** In addition to the Cornerstone Fellowship, the FJC has added a second group of individuals - Senior Fellows. The Senior Fellowship program is designed to allow past Cornerstone Fellows opportunities to expand on their learning and development. Each Sr. Fellow applicant must apply and be interviewed with FJC. We are excited to announce our two applicants have been accepted into the Senior Cornerstone Fellowship pilot program for 2019.

## Specialty camps



Specialty camps offer campers an additional opportunity to explore new things or expand their skill set within a given specialty. Last summer proved they are popular as more than 60 campers took part in at least one specialty camp. This summer,

we are expanding our offerings to include Robotics and Acro Gymnastics while continuing a Circus and Basketball camp.

Robotics specialty camp will involve hands on, team oriented tasks that will lead campers through the steps of building a robot. No experience is necessary for campers to enjoy the excitement of hands-on STEM learning and experience how creating something with technology can help shape a better future. Robotics camp is available to Senior and Super Seniors. Campers not involved in our specialty camp will have opportunities in their regular schedules to dabble in robotics.

Campers will spring into fun during our Acrobatic Gymnastics week. Laurelwood is teaming up with The Spot, a local acrobatics and dance Company and its owner Danielle Scarpellino for this camp. With a focus on flexibility, strength, balancing, limbering, tumbling, partnering, and contortion, this program builds confidence and is open to everyone, regardless of experience!

Basketball camp is reorganizing to better serve its participants. We are offering a morning session for 5th -9th grade campers and an afternoon session for K-4th grade campers. Dividing into two grade based groups allows campers to expand their development even further. Each session will be focusing on shooting, passing, dribbling, rebounding and defense.



The Big Top is returning to Laurelwood. Last year's circus performers were outstanding and every bit of effort and work they put in shined during their acts. This summer, circus camp will be run by Wunderle's Big Top Adventures. Campers will learn multiple acts: aerial acts including trapeze, fabric, and lyra; balancing acts including juggling, plate spinning, devil sticks, diabolos, feather balancing, hula hoops, jump ropes, lassos/hand stilts, unicycles, pedalos, rola bolas; and clowning and comedy transitions.
